# Solomon's Says

#### Pastoral Letter – Pastor Bill Nienstedt

[Jesus said], Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. John 12:12:24

As we mark the one-year anniversary of the pandemic this March, we remember the over 500,000 people who have been lost to the virus and the millions of families who have been affected in our country alone. Although we will never forget this tragic year, as Christians we take heart in the certain hope of the resurrection to eternal life.

Of course, suffering and pain have been with us from the time of the fall in the Garden of Eden. Yet, we tend to have short memories and forget the struggles our forebears endured throughout the ages.

In 1904, St. Mark's Evangelical Lutheran Church in the Little Germany district of Manhattan chartered the *General Slocum* excursion boat for their 17<sup>th</sup> annual picnic on Long Island. Over 1,400 passengers, mostly women and children, were on board when the ship caught fire. Tragically, the lifeboats were inaccessible, and the life preservers were useless. An estimated 1,021 people burned to death or drowned in the East River. Although this disaster led to new safety regulations, the loss permanently impacted the German immigrant community in Lower Manhattan.

Just seven years later, on March 25, 1911—110 years ago—a fire in the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory in Manhattan caused the deaths of 146 garment workers—123 women and girls and 23 men. The factory employed about 500 workers, mostly young Italian and Jewish women and girls. This was the deadliest industrial disaster in the history of the city, and one of the deadliest in U.S. history. Again, it took a disaster to enact needed fire safety regulations in factories and workplaces.

A little more than a year later, the RMS Titanic hit an iceberg in the North Atlantic and more than 1,500 people perished.

These tragedies are examples which show how fragile and precious life is. Every day is a blessing and a gift from God. None of us know how long we will live or what tomorrow will bring. We are temporary residents in this world that God has made. But, as Christians, we rest assured in the sure confidence of the Easter promise of eternal life. Death does not have the final word! Alleluia, Alleluia, Christ is risen!

Paul writes in Romans, "Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into his death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life." (Romans 6:3,4)

As baptized people of God, we proclaim the good news of the gospel every day in our words and deeds. As we look forward to better days ahead, remember that you are a reflection of Jesus Christ to others. Consider ways you can reach out to those who are suffering, challenged by poverty, injustice, disaster, or fractured relationships. Even small gestures can go a long way in improving the lives of others.

As we journey through this Easter season, I pray God's richest blessings on you and your family, and I invite you to remember the regeneration of spring and your new life in Christ Jesus. I hope to see many of you in church as we pray for an end to the pandemic in the coming weeks and months.

Christ is risen! Alleluia! He is risen indeed! Pastor Bill
