

A reading from Ephesians.

In Jesus, all of God's plans and purposes have been made know as heaven and earth are united in Christ. Through Jesus, we have been chosen as God's children and have been promised eternal salvation.

³ Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, ⁴ just as he chose us in Christ before the foundation of the world to be holy and blameless before him in love. ⁵ He destined us for adoption as his children through Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of his will, ⁶ to the praise of his glorious grace that he freely bestowed on us in the Beloved. ⁷ In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace 8 that he lavished on us. With all wisdom and insight 9 he has made known to us the mystery of his will, according to his good pleasure that he set forth in Christ, ¹⁰ as a plan for the fullness of time, to gather up all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth. 11 In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, ¹² so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. ¹³ In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; ¹⁴ this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

John begins his gospel with this prologue: a hymn to the Word through whom all things were created. This Word became flesh and brought grace and truth to the world.

[¹ In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ² He was in the beginning with God. ³ All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being ⁴ in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. ⁵ The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

⁶ There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ⁷ He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. ⁸ He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. ⁹ The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.]

¹⁰ He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. ¹¹ He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. ¹² But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, ¹³ who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

¹⁴ And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. ¹⁵ (John testified to him and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me.'") ¹⁶ From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. ¹⁷ The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. ¹⁸ No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.



Hymn Notes:

Our anthem by the men this morning, "God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen" is one of the oldest existing Christmas carols, dating to the 1500s and possibly even earlier. In the 15th Century, church music was typically sung in Latin and was dark and rather somber. As a result, most church goers did not like the religious songs of the period. So the faithful went about singing more uplifting songs in the streets. The nightwatchmen at the time are said to have sung "God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen" as they walked the streets of London. The first printed version of the song appeared in 1760 when it is referred to as "Tidings of Comfort and Joy." The melody was first in print in 1829, and the melody and lyrics were published together in 1833 in a collection titled, "Christmas Carols Ancient and Modern," compiled by William Sandys. The original meaning, in the 17th Century, of the word "rest" as it is used in this song meant "to keep or continue." This use of "rest" was obsolete by 1760. In today's language, the first line could read, "May God keep you in contented spirits, folks." "God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen" has been a traditional carol since the mid-18th Century. Some speculate that this is due to Queen Victoria's love of carols. The carol describes how Jesus has come to "save us all from Satan's power when we were gone astray" which is an appropriate theme for all mankind. Although somber and yet uplifting and inspiring, it is centered around the birth of Christ and conveys the Christmas message of hope and abundant joy. In today's world filled with unrest, could it be that we also need the message, "God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen" or "May God Keep you in contented spirits, folks." (Branchliving.com).

The earliest known publication of our sending song, "Go Tell It on the Mountain" is attributed to John Wesley Work, Jr. (1871-1925). He grew up in Nashville and developed a love of music from his father, a church choir director. He earned a Master's in Latin and became a teacher of Latin and ancient Greek, but his first love continued to be music. He became the first African-American collector of Negro spirituals, which had been shared by the oral tradition up to this point. The earliest printed version of "Go Tell" appeared in the book *Religious Songs of the Negro as Sung on the Plantations* (new edition, 1909) by Thomas P. Fenner. The text of "Go Tell It on the Mountain" references the annunciation to the shepherds described in the Gospel of Luke. (Wikipedia) What a wonderful carol to close out the Christmas season and share the good news with the world! "Go tell it on the mountain, over the hills and everywhere that Jesus Christ is born!"
