FIRST READING: Malachi 3:1-4

A reading from Malachi.

This reading concludes a larger section (2:17—3:5) in which the prophet speaks of the coming of the God of justice. Malachi looks for that day when the wondrous power of God will purify the priestly descendents of Levi who minister in the temple at Jerusalem.

¹ See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the LORD of hosts. ² But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears?

For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; ³ he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the LORD in righteousness. ⁴ Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the LORD as in the days of old and as in former years.


SECOND READING: Hebrews 2:14-18

A reading from Hebrews.

Jesus shared human nature fully so that his death might be for all humans a liberation from slavery to death's power. Here the writer uses the image of priestly service in the temple as a way of describing the life and saving death of the Lord Jesus. He is the high priest who offers his life on behalf of his brothers and sisters.

¹⁴ Since, therefore, the children share flesh and blood, [Jesus] himself likewise shared the same things, so that through death he might destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the devil, ¹⁵ and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by the fear of death. ¹⁶ For it is clear that he did not come to help angels, but the descendants of Abraham. ¹⁷ Therefore he had to become like his brothers and sisters in every respect, so that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make a sacrifice of atonement for the sins of the people. ¹⁸ Because he himself was tested by what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested.

GOSPEL: Luke 2:22-40

The holy gospel according to Luke. Glory to you, O Lord.

This story is a study in contrasts: the infant Jesus with the aged prophets; the joy of birth with the ominous words of Simeon to Mary; the faithful fulfilling of the law with the presentation of the one who will release its hold over us. Through it all, we see the light of God's salvation revealed to the world.

²² When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, [Mary and Joseph] brought [Jesus] up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord ²³ (as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord"), ²⁴ and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons."

²⁵ Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. ²⁶ It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. ²⁷ Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, ²⁸ Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

- ²⁹ "Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word;
- ³⁰ for my eyes have seen your salvation,
 - ³¹ which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,
- ³² a light for revelation to the Gentiles
 - and for glory to your people Israel."

³³ And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. ³⁴ Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, "This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed ³⁵ so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too."


³⁶ There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, ³⁷ then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshiped there with fasting and prayer night and day. ³⁸ At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

³⁹ When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. ⁴⁰ The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him.







Music Notes/Hymn Notes:

Our communion hymn this morning, "Let all mortal flesh keep silence" is one of the earliest Christian hymns still in common use in the church today. Traditionally, its roots date to the fourth century and it was originally credited to St. James, the brother of Jesus. However, later scholars believe it to have been created under Cyril of Jerusalem around c. 347. It was written in both Greek and Syriac and is still sung in Jerusalem on the Sunday after Christmas. The hymn is appropriate for both communion services and the celebration of the Incarnation. (Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins; Austin Lovelace).

Today we observe the Presentation of Our Lord in the temple in Jerusalem, which occurs 40 days after Christmas. It was on this day that Mary and Joseph brought Jesus to the temple and presented him to God with a sacrifice of two turtle doves. Two prophets met Mary and Joseph in the temple, Simeon and Anna. Both had been eagerly waiting for the birth of the Messiah and when Jesus appears in the temple, they recognize him. The proclamation of the child Jesus as God's Messiah is what makes today essentially a Christmas feast. Our sending hymn, "O Lord, Now Let Your Servant," is based on the *Nunc Dimittis*, a song often sung at the conclusion of communion. Today, we heard these words in the gospel reading, words spoken by Simeon when he held Jesus in his arms. What a fitting closing to our worship this morning. (Wikipedia.com)

Today's choir anthem is another hymn written by Rev Jaroslav Vajda whose information was shared a few Sundays ago in our music notes. "Where Shepherds Lately Knelt" was actually listed as a hymn for today and can be found in <u>All Creation Sings</u> #909. The hymn was written in 1986 for *The 1987 Christmas Annual* published by Augsburg Fortress. According to Pastor Vajda, he wanted to "place himself in spirit at the humble manger bed and review the implications of such a visit for himself and for all human beings. As the Christmas season truly comes to its conclusion, it is good to visit the manger one more time in order to ponder the significance of Immanuel, 'God-with-us' in the flesh." (Stephen P. Starke)
