FIRST READING: Jeremiah 17:5-10

A reading from Jeremiah.

These verses compose a poem that is part of a larger collection of wisdom sayings that contrast two ways of life. Life with God brings blessing; the power and vitality of God is active in our life. Life without God brings a curse, the power of death.

⁵ Thus says the LORD: Cursed are those who trust in mere mortals and make mere flesh their strength, whose hearts turn away from the LORD. ⁶ They shall be like a shrub in the desert, and shall not see when relief comes. They shall live in the parched places of the wilderness, in an uninhabited salt land. ⁷Blessed are those who trust in the LORD, whose trust is the LORD. ⁸ They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream. It shall not fear when heat comes, and its leaves shall stay green; in the year of drought it is not anxious, and it does not cease to bear fruit. ⁹ The heart is devious above all else; it is perverse who can understand it? ¹⁰ I the LORD test the mind and search the heart. to give to all according to their ways, according to the fruit of their doings.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 15:12-20


A reading from 1 Corinthians.

For Paul, the resurrection of Christ is the basis for Christian hope. Because Christ has been raised, those who are in Christ know that they too will be raised to a new life beyond death.

¹² Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say there is no resurrection of the dead? ¹³ If there is no resurrection of the dead, then Christ has not been raised; ¹⁴ and if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain and your faith has been in vain. ¹⁵ We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified of God that he raised Christ—whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. ¹⁶ For if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised. ¹⁷ If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. ¹⁸ Then those also who have died in Christ have perished. ¹⁹ If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied.

 $^{20}\,\mathrm{But}$ in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died.

GOSPEL: Luke 6:17-26

The holy gospel according to Luke. Glory to you, O Lord.

After choosing his twelve apostles, Jesus teaches a crowd of followers about the nature and demands of discipleship. He begins his great sermon with surprising statements about who is truly blessed in the eyes of God.

¹⁷ [Jesus] came down with [the twelve] and stood on a level place, with a great crowd of his disciples and a great multitude of people from all Judea, Jerusalem, and the coast of Tyre and Sidon.¹⁸ They had come to hear him and to be healed of their diseases; and those who were troubled with unclean spirits were cured. ¹⁹ And all in the crowd were trying to touch him, for power came out from him and healed all of them.

²⁰ Then he looked up at his disciples and said:

"Blessed are you who are poor,

for yours is the kingdom of God.

²¹ "Blessed are you who are hungry now, for you will be filled.

"Blessed are you who weep now,

for you will laugh.

Music Notes/Hymn Notes:

Jesus Shall Reign In 1719, Isaac Watts published a hymnal called <u>The Psalms of David, Imitated</u>. In his hymnal, Watts paraphrased many of the Psalms, but in different ways than his predecessors. His interpretations of the Psalms were really quite loose, as he endeavored to write something new while keeping with the spirit of the Psalms. Watts worked his way through most of the 150 Psalms, paraphrasing them, injecting them with New Testament truth, and framing them in singing form. Several of his Psalm paraphrases have become favorites. Many are included in the ELW. His rendition of Psalm 72 has been called the first missions hymn. We open our worship this morning with this hymn, "Jesus Shall Reign."

"Let Streams of Living Justice," our sending hymn this morning, was written by William Whitla. Set to Gustav Holst's THAXTED, the hymn was written in 1989 as a response to the events in Tiananmen Square, in Beijing, China; and dedicated to the mothers of the disappeared (in Argentina), the author's home community of Holy Trinity in Toronto, and the people of Tiananmen Square. It was first published in <u>Sing Justice</u>, <u>Do Justice</u> (Selah Publishing, 1998), the result of the Hymn Society in the United States and Canada's international search for new hymns on the subject of social justice. It was subsequently published in <u>Common Praise</u> (Anglican Church of Canada, 1998, #575) and in <u>Evangelical Lutheran Worship</u>. Whitla is now retired and is a priest in the Anglican Church of Canada, serving as an honorary assistant at the Church of the Holy Trinity in downtown Toronto. (Canterbury Dictionary of Hymnology). The tune, *Thaxted*, also appears in our hymnal, ELW #880, *O God Beyond All Praising*.

*The prelude and postlude this morning are both based on our sending hymn. However, the exact titles used by the arrangers, for the prelude: *O God Beyond All Praising*, and for the postlude, *Prelude on "Thaxted."* You have heard the hymn played for the past several weeks following the singing of our communion hymn. This was done to make the hymn more familiar as we close worship this morning.
