

¹⁰ While the Israelites were camped in Gilgal they kept the passover in the evening on the fourteenth day of the month in the plains of Jericho. ¹¹ On the day after the passover, on that very day, they ate the produce of the land, unleavened cakes and parched grain. ¹² The manna ceased on the day they ate the produce of the land, and the Israelites no longer had manna; they ate the crops of the land of Canaan that year.

SECOND READING: 2 Corinthians 5:16-21

A reading from 2 Corinthians.

One way to describe the gospel is the promise that in Christ everything is transformed into newness. All mistakes, all deliberate sins, all old history is reconciled with Christ's resurrection. This is Paul's strong message to the congregation in the city of Corinth.

¹⁶ From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. ¹⁷ So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! ¹⁸ All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; ¹⁹ that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. ²⁰ So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. ²¹ For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

GOSPEL: Luke 15:1-3, 11b-32

The holy gospel according to Luke.

Glory to you, O Lord.

Jesus tells a parable about a son who ponders his father's love only after he has spurned it. The grace he receives is beyond his hopes. That same grace is a crisis for an older brother who believes it is his obedience that has earned his place in the father's home.

¹ Now all the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to [Jesus.] ² And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, "This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them."

³ So he told them this parable: ^{11b} "There was a man who had two sons. ¹² The younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me.' So he divided his property between them. ¹³ A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and traveled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. ¹⁴ When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout that country, and he began to be in need. ¹⁵ So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. ¹⁶ He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. ¹⁷ But when he came to himself he said, 'How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! ¹⁸ I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; 19 I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands." 20 So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. ²¹ Then the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' 22 But the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly, bring out a robe—the best one—and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. ²³ And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; ²⁴ for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!' And they began to celebrate.


²⁵ "Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. ²⁶ He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. ²⁷ He replied, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound.' ²⁸ Then he became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. ²⁹ But he answered his father, 'Listen! 

Music Notes/Hymn Notes:

Our gathering hymn this morning, "Guide Me Ever, Great Redeemer," was written in Welsh by a Methodist minister, William Williams (1719-1791), a pioneering hymnist who did for Wales what Wesley and Watts did for England. It was translated to English in 1771, although the verses have gone through periodic "tweaking," with the hymn still known and often sung as "Guide Me, O Thou Great Redeemer." Williams' words are much admired for their plain yet majestic dignity. It is said this hymn is the greatest re-enactment of the Israelites journey through the barren wilderness to the Promised Land. This hymn is fitting for today as we continue our Lenten journey to the cross and consider the story of The Prodigal Son.. (www.telegraph.co.uk)

Our sending hymn this morning, "My Life Flows On in Endless Song," is a hymn all about perspective. It opens with an assertion that the troubles of this world are nothing when compared to the new creation that is to come. By keeping our focus on our Lord – that He is our Rock and that He lives – we can follow the admonition of the apostle James: "Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds" (James 1:2 ESV). (Hymnary.org).

*Today's prelude and postlude are both based on the tune we know as "O Sacred Head Now Wounded," also known as the "Passion Chorale." The melody was written by Hans Leo Hassler (1564-1612) and later harmonized by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750). Our hymn of the day, "Our Father, We Have Wandered," pairs the melody of this famous chorale with a text that is very fitting for today's gospel reading about the prodigal son. The harmonization we use for this hymn is the one composed by Bach. You will undoubtedly hear members of the choir singing Bach's harmonization while seated with you in the sanctuary this morning. You can find the harmonization in our hymnal, ELW #606.

This morning's choir anthem is another new piece for the choir this year, "And I Did Nothing: A Lenten Thought." Listen carefully to the text of those gifts God gives freely to us: his grace, love, mercy, hope, peace, comfort, breath, life, his victory over death...and I did nothing...and then the repeated text, "He died for me now let me live for him. He set me free and took away my sin. He died for me and I did nothing." What a powerful text as we move through this season of Lent!
