



FIRST READING: Isaiah 43:16-21

A reading from Isaiah.

The prophet declares that long ago God performed mighty deeds and delivered Israel from Egyptian bondage through the waters of the sea. Now, God is about to do a new thing, bringing the exiles out of Babylon and through the wilderness in a new Exodus.

¹⁶ Thus says the LORD, who makes a way in the sea, a path in the mighty waters,
¹⁷ who brings out chariot and horse, army and warrior;
they lie down, they cannot rise, they are extinguished, quenched like a wick:
¹⁸ Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old.
¹⁹ I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert.

²⁰ The wild animals will honor me, the jackals and the ostriches;

for I give water in the wilderness, rivers in the desert,

to give drink to my chosen people, ²¹ the people whom I formed for myself so that they might declare my praise.

SECOND READING: Philippians 3:4b-14


A reading from Philippians.

Writing to Christians in Philippi, Paul admits that his heritage and reputation could give him more reason than most people to place confidence in his spiritual pedigree. But the overwhelming grace of God in Jesus calls Paul to a new set of values.

[Paul writes:] ^{4b} If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: ⁵ circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; ⁶ as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. ⁷ Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. ⁸ More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ ⁹ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. ¹⁰ I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, ¹¹ if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

¹² Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. ¹³ Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, ¹⁴ I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

Word of God, word of life. **Thanks be to God.**



GOSPEL: John 12:1-8

The holy gospel according to John. Glory to you, O Lord.

Judas willfully misinterprets as waste Mary's extravagant act of anointing Jesus' feet with costly perfume. Jesus recognizes that her lavish gift is both an expression of love and an anticipation of his burial.

¹ Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. ² There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. ³ Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. ⁴ But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, ⁵ "Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?" ⁶ (He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) ⁷ Jesus said, "Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. ⁸ You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me."

The gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**




COMMUNION

Music Notes/Hymn Notes:

Our Hymn of the Day this morning, *What Wondrous Love Is This*, seems to express awe at the love of God and is somewhat reminiscent of the text of John 3:16. The text was first published in 1811, but there are few clues as to the author or composer. The melody has a Celtic influence and first made its appearance in the valleys of the Southern Appalachians. It was included in the historic *Southern Harmony*, compiled by William Walker. The hymn is simple and persistent. Each stanza of the hymn has a single thought which is underscored by repetition. It is this repetition that is said to come from one who has experienced the profound sacrificial love of Christ. However, it is the haunting melody that has made this hymn a popular one in this country. In addition to this being our Hymn of the Day, the tune is also included in the organ prelude. The words to our communion hymn this morning, "My Faith Looks Up to Thee," were written by Ray Palmer, while teaching at a private girls' school in New York. He had been through a difficult year of illness and loneliness and wrote these verses one night after meditating on a German poem depicting a sinner kneeling before the cross of Christ. He wrote the words into a notebook which he later shared with Lowell Mason, the composer of the tune to this hymn. Mason told Palmer that he (Palmer) would be best remembered as the author of "My Faith Looks Up to Thee." A hymn of prayer, Palmer is quoted as saying, "The words for these stanzas were born out of my own soul, with very little effort. I recall that I wrote the verses with tender emotion. When writing the last line, "O bear me safe above, a ransomed soul," the thought that the whole work of redemption and salvation was involved in those words brought me to a degree of emotion that brought abundant tears." Palmer is considered to be one of America's best 19th century hymn writers. He became an ordained pastor, serving churches in Maine and New York. He also published several volumes of poems and hymns and his complete poetical works were published in 1876. (Hymnary.org)
