

Hymn Music Notes:

In a world filled with false gods, our gathering hymn, "Holy, Holy," exalts the one true God. This joyful hymn celebrates God's eternal and powerful presence. And it also reminds us of our own destiny, for someday, we too will sing "around the glassy sea." Reginald Heber wrote "Holy, Holy, Holy" while serving as a vicar in England. He was the first to compile a hymnal ordering hymns around the church calendar. Wanting to celebrate a triune God, Heber wrote "Holy, Holy, Holy" for Trinity Sunday--a day that reaffirmed the doctrine of the Trinity and was observed eight Sundays after Easter. The hymn was first published in 1826. Years later, John Dykes composed the tune Nicaea especially for Heber's "Holy, Holy, Holy." So, as we sing our gathering hymn this morning, take time to look for God's holiness. All around us, God's creation showcases his holiness. And when we truly open our eyes to it, we can't help but raise our voices with the angels in singing "Holy, Holy," (Songsandhymns.org).

The text of today's hymn of the day, "Come Join the Dance of Trinity" was written by Richard Leach in 2002. Since then, it has appeared in a number of hymnals, sung to the tune Kingsfold, an English folk tune. Leach has said that he wanted to write hymn texts that are "biblically and theologically sound," which he accomplishes well in this hymn. Each of the first three verses addresses each part of the Trinity. The first verse speaks of the Father, the Creator, who is the originator of the dance. The second verse speaks of the life of Jesus, stating the "the Trinity is meant for human flesh and bone," reminding us that the dance isn't only for the divine, but for us as well. The third verse is for the Spirit, reminding us of Pentecost and spreading the word. The final verse begins with the words "Within the dance." We, as the singers and believers, have moved past being invited to the dance, we are now within it. The interweaving nature of the dance of the Trinity to include us, makes this hymn a very active one. It is a celebration of our ability to move, to dance, and to sing within the Trinity: "Let voices rise and interweave, / by love and hope set free." It's a wonderful hymn to sing at any time, but especially today, Trinity Sunday, to remember that we are part of the divine, as much as they are a part of us. (firstuccnp.com; umcdiscipleship.org)
