FIRST READING: Deuteronomy 30:9-14

A reading from Deuteronomy.

Moses calls the people who are about to enter the promised land to renew the covenant God made with their ancestors. Through this covenant God gives life and asks for obedience. God's commandment is neither burdensome nor too far off, but dwells in the people's hearts. ⁹ The LORD your God will make you abundantly prosperous in all your undertakings, in the fruit of your body, in the fruit of your livestock, and in the fruit of your soil. For the LORD will again take delight in prospering you, just as he delighted in prospering your ancestors, ¹⁰ when you obey the LORD your God by observing his commandments and decrees that are written in this book of the law, because you turn to the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul.

¹¹ "Surely, this commandment that I am commanding you today is not too hard for you, nor is it too far away. ¹² It is not in heaven, that you should say, 'Who will go up to heaven for us and get it for us so that we may hear it and observe it?' ¹³ Neither is it beyond the sea, that you should say, 'Who will cross to the other side of the sea for us and get it for us so that we may hear it and observe it?' ¹⁴ No, the word is very near to you; it is in your mouth and in your heart for you to observe.

The letter to the Colossians was written to warn its readers of various false teachings. The first part of the letter is an expression of thanks for the faith, hope, and love that mark this community, including a prayer for strength and courage.

¹ Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and Timothy our brother,

² To the saints and faithful brothers and sisters in Christ in Colossae:

Grace to you and peace from God our Father.

³ In our prayers for you we always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, ⁴ for we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, ⁵ because of the hope laid up for you in heaven. You have heard of this hope before in the word of the truth, the gospel ⁶ that has come to you. Just as it is bearing fruit and growing in the whole world, so it has been bearing fruit among yourselves from the day you heard it and truly comprehended the grace of God. ⁷ This you learned from Epaphras, our beloved fellow servant. He is a faithful minister of Christ on our behalf, ⁸ and he has made known to us your love in the Spirit.

⁹ For this reason, since the day we heard it, we have not ceased praying for you and asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of God's will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, ¹⁰ so that you may walk worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, as you bear fruit in every good work and as you grow in the knowledge of God. ¹¹ May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, so that you may have all endurance and patience, joyfully ¹² giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. ¹³ He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, ¹⁴ in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

GOSPEL: Luke 10:25-37

The holy gospel according to Luke. Glory to you, O Lord.

Jesus is challenged to explain what is involved in obeying the greatest commandment. He tells a parable rich in surprises: those expected to show pity display hard hearts while the lowly give and receive unexpected and lavish mercy.

²⁵ An expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" ²⁶ He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" ²⁷ He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind and your neighbor as yourself." ²⁸ And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live."

²⁹ But wanting to vindicate himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" ³⁰ Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and took off, leaving him half dead. ³¹ Now by chance a priest was going down that road, and when he saw him he passed by on the other side. ³² So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. ³³ But a Samaritan while traveling came upon him, and when he saw him he was moved with compassion. ³⁴ He went to him and bandaged his wounds, treating them with oil and wine. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. ³⁵ The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him, and when I come back I will repay you whatever more you spend.' ³⁶ Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" ³⁷ He said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

Hymn Notes:

The prelude this morning, *Voluntary on "St. Columba*" uses the tune for our hymn of the day, "Before the Water Nourished Earth."

Our gathering hymn this morning, "As We Gather at Your Table," was written by Carl P. Daw, Jr (1944-), an Episcopal priest and writer. The hymn was written by request in 1989 for the Eastern Shore Chapel (Episcopal), Virginia Beach, Virginia, which was celebrating the tricentenary of its founding in 1689. The motto for the occasion was 'Repeat the sounding joy' (from Isaac Watts*, 'Joy to the world, the Lord is come'*) which Daw has incorporated in the last line, the climax of this fine hymn of worship and service. The first line is simple and beautiful in its simplicity: it suggests that the hymn that follows will be a hymn for Holy Communion, and it is certainly suitable for that; but the three stanzas spread Christian experience out include the whole of forgiveness and love. to (hymnology.hymnsam.co.uk)

Our communion hymn this morning, "Spirit of God, Descend Upon My Heart," is the work of George Croly (1780-1860, an Anglican mnister whose writings included poetry, novels, history, and biography.. The words of this sung prayer are among the most passionate in the history of hymnody. From the first line, the poet entreats the Holy Spirit to "descend upon [his] heart." The prayer continues: "wean [my heart] from earth;" "move" through the very pulsing of my heart; "stoop to my weakness" and "make me love thee as I ought to love." The second verse asks the Spirit to "take the dimness of my soul away." The third verse has the image of the cross as a source of solace, seeking God through the cross. The fourth stanza looks heavenward as the poet seeks to love God "as thine angels love.," with the final line showing a perfect union with God: "my heart an altar, and your love the flame." Written in response to a call for hymns on social welfare, our sending hymn today, "Lord, Whose Love in Humble Service," is a text by Albert Bayly. It became the conference hymn for the 1961 National Conference on Churches and Social Welfare. It challenges us to reflect Christ's love not just in worship but in daily acts of service—whether in homes, hospitals, streets, or schools. Set to the American folk tune *BEACH SPRING*, rooted in the Sacred Harp singing tradition, the hymn's earthy, honest melody pairs beautifully with its message of hands-on Christianity. It reminds us that worship must lead to mission—serving others with the same selfless love shown by Jesus.
