# FIRST READING: Genesis 18:1-10a

A reading from Genesis.

The LORD visits Abraham and Sarah to tell them that the long-awaited promise of the birth of a child will be fulfilled for them in their old age.

<sup>1</sup> The LORD appeared to Abraham by the oaks of Mamre, as he sat at the entrance of his tent in the heat of the day. <sup>2</sup> He looked up and saw three men standing near him. When he saw them, he ran from the tent entrance to meet them and bowed down to the ground. <sup>3</sup> He said, "My lord, if I find favor with you, do not pass by your servant. <sup>4</sup> Let a little water be brought, and wash your feet, and rest yourselves under the tree. <sup>5</sup> Let me bring a little bread, that you may refresh yourselves, and after that you may pass on—since you have come to your servant." So they said, "Do as you have said." <sup>6</sup> And Abraham hastened into the tent to Sarah and said, "Make ready quickly three measures of choice flour, knead it, and make cakes." <sup>7</sup> Abraham ran to the herd and took a calf, tender and good, and gave it to the servant, who hastened to prepare it. <sup>8</sup> Then he took curds and milk and the calf that he had prepared and set it before them, and he stood by them under the tree while they ate.

# **SECOND READING: Colossians 1:15-28**

A reading from Colossians.

This letter offers a mystical teaching, that the great mystery of God is "Christ in you." Because Christ is present in the church, Christians share in his life, suffering, and glory.

<sup>15</sup> [Christ Jesus] is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation, <sup>16</sup> for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. <sup>17</sup> He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. <sup>18</sup> He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. <sup>19</sup> For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, <sup>20</sup> and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

<sup>21</sup> And you who were once estranged and hostile in mind, doing evil deeds, <sup>22</sup> he has now reconciled in his fleshly body through death, so as to present you holy and blameless and irreproachable before him, <sup>23</sup> provided that you continue securely established and steadfast in the faith, without shifting from the hope promised by the gospel that you heard, which has been proclaimed to every creature under heaven. I, Paul, became a minister of this gospel.

<sup>24</sup> I am now rejoicing in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am completing what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the church. <sup>25</sup> I became its minister according to God's commission that was given to me for you, to make the word of God fully known, <sup>26</sup> the mystery that has been hidden throughout the ages and generations but has now been revealed to his saints. <sup>27</sup> To them God chose to make known how great among the gentiles are the riches of the glory of this mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory. <sup>28</sup> It is he whom we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone in all wisdom, so that we may present everyone mature in Christ.

## Hymn Notes:

Although written over eight hundred years ago, the hymn "Jesus, the Very Thought of Thee," our hymn of the day this morning, contains timeless, biblical truths that still touch the worshiper's heart today. Adoration for God flows sweet and pure from each word, line, and stanza and builds to a increasing praise midway through the hymn with beautiful descriptions of Jesus's character and wondrous acts of mercy. Scholars believe that Bernard of Clairvaux (1091-1153)

originally wrote "Dulcis Jesus Memoria," the 42-stanza poem from which "Jesus, the Very Thought of Thee" was derived. While the earliest manuscripts do not indicate the use of Bernard's poem, church history shows it being used as a hymn as early as the 13<sup>th</sup> century. Since then, many variations on the poem have been written, including the translated and edited version found in today's English hymnals. (<u>Christianity.com</u>)

"Day by Day" Like so many Christians, Carolina Sandell learned that when pain and tragedy strike, God often uses that experience to deepen our faith. At age 26, Carolina experienced a tragedy that greatly affected the course of her life. She and her father, a Lutheran pastor, were crossing a Swedish lake, when the ship suddenly lurched, throwing her father overboard, and he drowned. Even though she had previously written many hymns, after losing her father, she poured out her heart in an endless stream of beautiful songs. Two of her most famous hymns used widely in America are "Children of the Heavenly Father," and today's communion hymn, "Day by Day." Truly a hymn of assurance, "Day by Day" reminds us that although no one can accurately predict the future, God knows what will happen and is in complete control of all coming events. Our sending hymn this morning, "O Savior Precious Savior," was written in 1870 by Frances Ridley Havergal, a prolific hymn writer of the 19th century. Known for her deep personal faith and poetic talent, Havergal sought to express her devotion to Jesus Christ through her hymns. This particular hymn reflects her desire to exalt the Savior, even though He is "unseen," capturing the thoughts in 1 Peter 1:8, which speaks of loving Christ without having seen Him. The hymn's lyrics are rich in theology acknowledging Jesus as the "bringer of salvation" and the "revelation of love beyond our thought." These lines emphasize the mystery and magnitude of Christ's redemptive work. Her ability to convey profound spiritual truths in simple language has made her hymns enduring favorites among Christians. Over the years, "O Savior, Precious Savior" has been included in numerous hymnals across various denominations, speaking to its widespread acceptance and the timeless relevance of its message.
