

FIRST READING: Genesis 18:20-32

A reading from Genesis.

In today's reading, Abraham undertakes the role of a mediator between God and sinful humanity. Appealing to God's justice, Abraham boldly asks for mercy for the city of Sodom for the sake of the few righteous people there, including Abraham's nephew, Lot.

²⁰ Then the LORD said, "How great is the outcry against Sodom and Gomorrah and how very grave their sin! ²¹ I must go down and see whether they have done altogether according to the outcry that has come to me, and if not, I will know."

²² So the men turned from there and went toward Sodom, while Abraham remained standing before the LORD. ²³ Then Abraham came near and said, "Will you indeed sweep away the righteous with the wicked? ²⁴ Suppose there are fifty righteous within the city; will you then sweep away the place and not forgive it for the fifty righteous who are in it? ²⁵ Far be it from you to do such a thing, to slay the righteous with the wicked, so that the righteous fare as the wicked! Far be that from you! Shall not the Judge of all the earth do what is just?" ²⁶ And the LORD said, "If I find at Sodom fifty righteous in the city, I will forgive the whole place for their sake." ²⁷ Abraham answered, "Let me take it upon myself to speak to my lord, I who am but dust and ashes. ²⁸ Suppose five of the fifty righteous are lacking? Will you destroy the whole city for lack of five?" And he said, "I will not destroy it if I find forty-five there." ²⁹ Again he spoke to him, "Suppose forty are found there." He answered, "For the sake of forty I will not do it." 30 Then he said, "Oh, do not let my lord be angry if I speak. Suppose thirty are found there." He answered, "I will not do it, if I find thirty there." ³¹ He said, "Let me take it upon myself to speak to my lord. Suppose twenty are found there." He answered, "For the sake of twenty I will not destroy it." ³² Then he said, "Oh, do not let my lord be angry if I speak just once more. Suppose ten are found there." He answered, "For the sake of ten I will not destroy it."

SECOND READING: Colossians 2:6-15 [16-19]

A reading from Colossians.

The writer of this letter warns the congregation in Colossae about "the empty lure" of philosophies and traditions that compromise faith. Through the gift of faith, the church is mystically connected with Christ in his death and resurrection which is enacted in baptism.

⁶ As you therefore have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to walk in him, ⁷ rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving.

⁸ Watch out that no one takes you captive through philosophy and empty deceit, according to human tradition, according to the elemental principles of the world, and not according to Christ. ⁹ For in him the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily, ¹⁰ and you have come to fullness in him, who is the head of every ruler and authority. ¹¹ In him also you were circumcised with a spiritual circumcision, by the removal of the body of the flesh in the circumcision of Christ; ¹² when you were buried with him in baptism, you were also raised with him through faith in the power of God, who raised him from the dead. ¹³ And when you were dead in trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, God made you alive together with him, when he forgave us all our trespasses, ¹⁴ erasing the record that stood against us with its legal demands. He set this aside, nailing it to the cross. ¹⁵ He disarmed the rulers and authorities and made a public example of them, triumphing over them in it. [

¹⁶ Therefore, do not let anyone condemn you in matters of food or drink or of observing festivals, new moons, or Sabbaths. ¹⁷ These are only a shadow of what is to come, but the body belongs to Christ. ¹⁸ Do not let anyone disqualify you, insisting on self-abasement and worship of angels, initiatory visions, puffed up without cause by a human way of thinking, ¹⁹ and not holding fast to the head, from whom the whole body, nourished and held together by its ligaments and tendons, grows with a growth that is from God.]

⁹ "So I say to you, Ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. ¹⁰ For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened. ¹¹ Is there anyone among you who, if your child asked for a fish, would give a snake instead of a fish? ¹² Or if

the child asked for an egg, would give a scorpion? ¹³ If you, then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!"





Music Notes/Hymn Notes:

Our gathering hymn this morning, "Praise My Soul, the King of Heaven," was written by Henry Lyte, one of England's greatest hymnists. For 23 years he served as a pastor at a local church in Brixham. In spite of frail health and weak lungs, Lyte established a Sunday School of 800 children in Brixham. In addition to preaching and serving his church, Lyte wrote hymns and ministered to sailors on the docks. In 1884, he published a small book that included this hymn, based on Psalm 103. Queen Elizabeth II used this hymn for her wedding hymn in Westminister Abbey on November 20, 1947. In his early fifties, Lyte realized his lung issues had deteriorated to tuberculosis, and after preaching his last sermon on September 4, 1847, he walked over the grounds of his home and worked on his hymn, "Abide with Me." He died on November 20, 1847 and is buried in Nice. (Then Sings My Soul: Robert J. Morgan; page 63). Today's communion hymn is "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." The author of the text was Joseph M. Scriven whose life was hard and filled with tragedy. On the eve of his wedding, his fiancée died tragically. He moved to Canada from Ireland, and again, lost a second fiancée from a sudden illness. Shortly after moving to Canada, he wrote the text to "What a Friend" to send to his mother back in Ireland to comfort her in a time of sorrow. After its publication, a neighbor asked Scriven if he really did write it and he replied, "The Lord and I did it between us" (Lutheran Hymnal Handbook). As one of the best known and well-loved hymns of comfort, it is certain that the Lord used Scriven to bless many in their own time of sorrow. (Hymnary.org)

Tomorrow, July 28, 2025, marks the 275th anniversary of the death of Johann Sebastian Bach. His death on July 28, 1750, is attributed to complications due to unsuccessful eye surgery, leading to a stroke and high fever. Bach was born in 1685 into an already accomplished musical family. He married twice and was the father of 20 children, only 10 who survived to adulthood. Today, his work is regarded as among the finest of mature baroque <u>music</u> (c. 1600-1750). More famous as an organist than as a composer in his own lifetime, Bach's rich legacy encompasses sacred and secular works, notably cantatas, of which 209 have survived to this day, organ pieces, and concertos which influenced many later composers. Today, we recognize and honor the genius of Bach and his contributions to church music, especially to the Lutheran Church. Bach harmonized many chorales, but sadly only 8 are included in our current ELW hymnal. If time permits during communion distribution, some of these will be played today.

Today's prelude is *Sinfonia* from Cantata #156, written for the 3rd Sunday after the Epiphany in 1729. The postlude, *Fugue in C Major*, is part of his Eight Little Preludes and Fugues, written during his early years, commonly referred to as his youthful period, while he was court organist at Weimar. (www.worldhistory.org;chambermusicsociety.org;www.biography.com; and Eight Little Preludes and Fugues, Caspar Koch).

One additional note, the Canticle of Praise and the Post Communion hymn we sing today are both Bach harmonizations included in our current ELW hymnal.
