FIRST READING: Ecclesiastes 1:2, 12-14; 2:18-23

A reading from Ecclesiastes.

The teacher of wisdom who wrote Ecclesiastes sees that working for mere accumulation of wealth turns life into an empty game, a "vanity of vanities." Nevertheless, he asserts in the next verse, it is good to find enjoyment in one's work because such enjoyment is a gift from God.

² Vanity of vanities, says the Teacher, vanity of vanities! All is vanity.

¹² I, the Teacher, was king over Israel in Jerusalem. ¹³ I applied my mind to seek and to search out by wisdom all that is done under heaven; it is an unhappy business that God has given to humans to be busy with. ¹⁴ I saw all the deeds that are done under the sun, and see, all is vanity and a chasing after wind.

^{2:18} I hated all my toil in which I had toiled under the sun, seeing that I must leave it to my successor, ¹⁹ and who knows whether he will be wise or foolish? Yet he will be master of all for which I toiled and used my wisdom under the sun. This also is vanity. ²⁰ So I turned and gave my heart up to despair concerning all the toil of my labors under the sun, ²¹ because sometimes one who has toiled with wisdom and knowledge and skill must leave all to be enjoyed by another who did not toil for it. This also is vanity and a great evil. ²² What do mortals get from all the toil and strain with which they toil under the sun? ²³ For all their days are full of pain, and their work is a vexation; even at night their minds do not rest. This also is vanity.

SECOND READING: Colossians 3:1-11

A reading from Colossians.

Life in Christ includes a radical reorientation of our values. Just as the newly baptized shed their old clothes and put on new garments, so Christians are called to let go of greed and take hold of a life shaped by God's love in Christ.

¹ So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. ² Set your minds on the things that are above, not on the things that are on earth, ³ for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. ⁴ When Christ who is your life is revealed, then you also will be revealed with him in glory.

⁵ Put to death, therefore, whatever in you is earthly: sexual immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire, and greed (which is idolatry). ⁶ On account of these the wrath of God is coming on those who are disobedient. ⁷ These are the ways you also once followed, when you were living that life. ⁸ But now you must get rid of all such things: anger, wrath, malice, slander, and abusive language from your mouth. ⁹ Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have stripped off the old self with its practices ¹⁰ and have clothed yourselves with the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge according to the image of its creator. ¹¹ In that renewal there is no longer Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, enslaved and free, but Christ is all and in all!

Hymn Notes:

Special thanks to Judy Johnson and Martie Veilleux for their duet this morning during worship. We appreciate their willingness to share their talents with us today!

Next Sunday, August 10, we will once again have a hymn sing prior to worship. Come prepared with your favorite hymn name and number from our ELW hymnal, or fill out one of the hymn sheets on the sign-up table in the Sunday School room. We will begin around 10:05 AM.

Our hymn of the day this morning, "God of grace and God of glory" was written in the summer of 1930 by Harry Emerson Fosdick (1878-1969) to be used for the opening service and for the dedication of the famous Riverside Church in New York City. Fosdick wrote the hymn as he reflected on the construction of the new building. As we sing this hymn, it may be helpful to remind ourselves of the events that shaped the "hour" and the "days" that provide the context of the hymn. The hymn was written while the United States was in the throes of the Great Depression between the two World Wars. Fosdick was a champion of the social gospel, a movement that recognized the plight of the poor, especially in the urban Northeast during the Industrial Revolution. The language of the hymn is ultimately that of petition or prayer. "Grant us wisdom, grant us courage" concludes each stanza with the effect of a refrain, asking for God's wisdom and courage to face the problems of our day. We beg for God's power, confess our fear and pride, and affirm a desire to seek social justice. (Umcdiscipleship.org; hymnary.org).

Our communion hymn (and also our organ prelude) Let Us Break Bread Together on Our Knees, is believed to have been created in the west African Gullah Slave Culture that developed along the coastal areas of Southeastern Colonial America, including St. Helena Island, Beaufort, and Charleston, South Carolina. There are very few spirituals which deal with communion, but the simplicity and profound insights of this hymn have made it very popular in American hymnals since about 1955. It was said American slaves communicated their intent to escape through many of their spirituals. This particular spiritual actually became a hymn of the Underground Railroad. Today it is a common hymn used for communion, reminding us of our spiritual food and drink presented through the bread and wine. It continues to be found in the hymnals of many denominations today.
