

A reading from Genesis.

God promises childless and aging Abram that a child of his own will be his heir and that his descendants will number as many as the stars. Abram trusts God's promise, and through this faith he is considered righteous.

¹ After these things the word of the LORD came to Abram in a vision, "Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great." ² But Abram said, "O Lord GOD, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?" ³ And Abram said, "You have given me no offspring, so a slave born in my house is to be my heir." ⁴ But the word of the LORD came to him, "This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir." ⁵ He brought him outside and said, "Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them." Then he said to him, "So shall your descendants be." ⁶ And he believed the LORD, and the LORD reckoned it to him as righteousness.

SECOND READING: Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16

A reading from Hebrews.

Abraham and Sarah exemplify the vision of faith that people of God enact in every age. Their hope and trust in God's promise allowed them to face an unknown future and to receive the promise of God.

¹ Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. ² Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. ³ By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible.

⁸ By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance, and he set out, not knowing where he was going. ⁹ By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. ¹⁰ For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. ¹¹ By faith, with Sarah's involvement, he received power of procreation, even though he was too old, because he considered him faithful who had promised. ¹² Therefore from one person, and


this one as good as dead, descendants were born, "as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore."

¹³ All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, ¹⁴ for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. ¹⁵ If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. ¹⁶ But as it is, they desire a better homeland, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.







Music Notes/Hymn Notes:

Our Hymn of the Day this morning, "Great Is Thy Faithfulness," was written by Thomas Chisholm, who was born in Kentucky in 1866. He lived a pretty unremarkable life, working as a school teacher, a newspaper editor, an insurance agent, and also doing evangelistic work. Through all sorts of ups and downs in his life, including on-going health problems, he discovered new blessings from God every morning. The 3rd chapter of Lamentations became special to him: "His compassions fail not. They are new ever morning; Great is Your faithfulness." Unlike many hymns that have heart-wrenching stories behind them, "Great Is Thy Faithfulness" is inspired by the simple realization that God is at work in our lives on a daily basis. Chisholm wrote, "My income has not been large at any time due to impaired health. I must not fail to record here the unfailing faithfulness of a covenant-keeping God, who has given me many wonderful displays of His providing care, for which I am filled with astonishing gratefulness." The hymn reminds us that God doesn't only work in dramatic or miraculous ways, but also in simple, everyday ways. It also reminds us that Jesus has never failed us in the past, so we have no reason to doubt his faithfulness in the future. Chisholm spent his retirement years at the Methodist Home for the Aged in New Jersey, where he died in 1960, having written 1200 poems and hymns during his lifetime. (Hymnary.org; Then Sings My Soul: Morgan, pg. 285).

Isaiah 41:9-10 says, "I took you from the ends of the earth, from its farthest corners I called you. I said, 'You are my servant'; I have chosen you and have not rejected you. So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand." No matter our situation, no matter our struggles and fears, no matter doubts, we are told to have courage, for the Lord is our God. And as Isaac Watts writes so powerfully in our sending hymn, "O God, Our Help in Ages Past," our God is everlasting, and will be our help through all of our years. The very first verse gives us every assurance we need: God is our help, our hope, and our home. This does not simply dismiss our fears and troubles. They are, and always will be, very real. But it does assure us that even if we cannot feel the immediate comfort, or even when all we can do is grieve, we have a God that withstands the storms of life and the tests of time, and who protects us and hears our cries.
