



A reading from Hebrews.

Using images of Moses, the writer presents a striking vision of the new covenant of God made possible in Christ. There is no longer fear; only awe in the new promise in Christ into which we are invited.

¹⁸ You have not come to something that can be touched, a blazing fire, and darkness, and gloom, and a tempest, ¹⁹ and the sound of a trumpet, and a voice whose words made the hearers beg that not another word be spoken to them. ²⁰ (For they could not endure the order that was given, "If even an animal touches the mountain, it shall be stoned to death." ²¹ Indeed, so terrifying was the sight that Moses said, "I tremble with fear.") ²² But you have come to Mount Zion and to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to innumerable angels in festal gathering, ²³ and to the assembly of the firstborn who are enrolled in heaven, and to God the judge of all, and to the spirits of the righteous made perfect, ²⁴ and to Jesus, the mediator of a new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel.

²⁵ See that you do not refuse the one who is speaking, for if they did not escape when they refused the one who warned them on earth, how much less will we escape if we reject the one who warns from heaven! ²⁶ At that time his voice shook the earth, but now he has promised, "Yet once more I will shake not only the earth but also the heaven." ²⁷ This phrase, "Yet once more," indicates the removal of what is shaken—that is, created things—so that what cannot be shaken may remain. ²⁸ Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us show gratitude, by which we may offer to God an acceptable worship with reverence and awe, ²⁹ for indeed our God is a consuming fire.

Jesus heals a woman on the sabbath, offering her a new beginning for her life. When challenged by a narrow reading of the sabbath command, Jesus responds by expanding "sabbath work" to include setting people free from bondage.

¹⁰ Now [Jesus] was teaching in one of the synagogues on the Sabbath. ¹¹ And just then there appeared a woman with a spirit that had crippled her for eighteen years. She was bent over and was quite unable to stand up straight. ¹² When Jesus saw her, he called her over and said, "Woman, you are set free from your ailment." ¹³ When he laid his hands on her, immediately she stood up straight and began praising God. ¹⁴ But the leader of the synagogue, indignant because Jesus had cured on the Sabbath, kept saying to the crowd, "There are six days on which work ought to be done; come on those days and be cured and not on the Sabbath day." ¹⁵ But the Lord answered him and said, "You hypocrites! Does not each of you on the Sabbath untie his ox or his donkey from the manger and lead it to water? ¹⁶ And ought not this woman, a daughter of Abraham whom Satan bound for eighteen long years, be set free from this bondage on the Sabbath day?" ¹⁷ When he said this, all his opponents were put to shame, and the entire crowd was rejoicing at all the wonderful things being done by him.







Hymn Notes:

Our Gathering Hymn this morning, "Praise to the Lord the Almighty," was written by Joachim Neander, known to be the first hymnwriter from the Calvinist branch of Protestantism. Neander often took walks near his home in Hochdal, Germany, walks that he called worship walks. It was during these walks that he often composed hymns. Based loosely on Psalm 103: 1-6 and Psalm 150, Joachim wrote five verses in the original hymn, published in 1680. Said to be a magnificent hymn of praise to God, he wrote this while battling tuberculosis...where he included the words: *Praise to the Lord, the Almighty, the King of Creation. O my soul praise Him, for He is thy health and salvation*. This is a hymn that has stood the test of time to remain one of the most beloved hymns in the Church. As we sing these words today, "we join the voices of millions who have gone before us and those across the world, to sing these great words of thanksgiving and honor to the God who created us, protects us, and befriends us." (Hymnary.org) (Then Sings My Soul; Robert J. Morgan, pg. 27).

Our communion hymn, *Come, Ye Disconsolate,* was written by Thomas Moore and first published in his own collection *Sacred Songs* in 1816. The hymn is an invitation for sinners to come to Christ with their sorrows to find healing (st. 1), to experience hope and comfort (st. 2), and to participate in the feast of the Lamb (st. 3). You will note that every stanza ends with the phrase "earth has no sorrow" that is beyond the power of heaven to remove. Regardless of our sorrows, God has sent a comforter, the Holy Spirit, to help us through the difficult times we may face. How comforting to know we truly are not alone! (Hymnary.org)

Our sending this morning, "Oh for a Thousand Tongues to Sing," was written in 1739 by Charles Wesley. His original version, written on the first anniversary of his conversion to Christianity, included 18 verses! Ours uses only 6 of those verses. The hymn was published in *Hymns and Sacred Poems* (1740), a hymnal compiled by Wesley and his brother John. It is a declaration of Christ's power and victory in Wesley's life. Rich in Biblical imagery of the Kingdom of God, "Oh for a Thousand Tongues" can become our own hymn of praise. In the hymn, we can stand with the angels before the throne of God, lifting our voices as one church to glorify the one who "bids our sorrows cease. Join with us as we open our worship, lifting your voices to praise the glory of His name! (Hymnary.org; Wikipedia)
