<sup>12</sup> He said also to the one who had invited him, "When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers and sisters or your relatives or rich neighbors, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid. <sup>13</sup> But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. <sup>14</sup> And you will be blessed because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

# **Music Notes/Hymn Notes:**

"O God beyond all praising," our gathering hymn this morning, was written specifically for the melody THAXTED in 1982 by Michael Perry, a British hymnwriter. The early 20th-century British composer Gustav Holst (1874-1934) wrote the tune, which is normally associated in the U.K. with a more patriotic text, "I Vow to Thee My Country." Perry composed this new text, he said, "in response to a call for alternative words that would be more appropriate for Christian worship." Rarely is a symphonic theme taken in its entirety and used for a hymn tune. The ranges are usually too wide and the phrases may be too long for congregational singing. The melody THAXTED, named for a small town in the Uttlesford district of Essex, comes from the middle section of the "Jupiter" movement in Holst's orchestral suite, The Planets (1914-1916). In 1921, Holst adapted the theme to fit a patriotic poem "I vow to thee my country" (1908), referenced above. It is often sung at Remembrance Day services, and Princess Diana requested it for her wedding in 1981 and it was repeated for her funeral in 1997. Perry turned the tune into a majestic hymn that is rooted in Scripture: verses from Psalms 116 and 130, as well as a text in Hebrews and adds meaning to your worship this morning. James. Our sending hymn this morning, "Lord, Dismiss Us with Your (Thy) Blessing," was written by John Fawcett (1740-1817), and was included in the *Shawbury Hymn Book, 1773*. Fawcett, best known for his hymn "Blest Be the Tie that Binds," probably intended for this hymn for the last Sunday of the year, asking God's blessings on the new year ahead. However, it is generally sung at the conclusion of worship as a choral benediction or a closing hymn. Fawcett was an English minister who wrote over 160 hymns, mostly to be sung after his sermons. Of those 160 hymns, only "Lord, Dismiss Us with Your Blessing," and "Blest Be the Tie that Binds," are included in our ELW hymnal.

The prelude this morning, "Now We Join in Celebration," was arranged by Donald Busarow (1934-2011) a well known Lutheran musician, teacher, professor, and composer. The prelude uses the tune "Schmucke dich," which is the tune for our communion hymn and also for an additional communion hymn in our hymnal, #488, "Soul, Adorn Yourself with Gladness. The tune was composed by Johann Cruger (1598-1662).
