Holy Cross Day

This festival, which originated in the fourth century, celebrates the triumph of the cross. Paul reminds us that Christ crucified is the power and wisdom of God. As Moses put a serpent on a pole to be a source of healing for the Israelites, we lift high the cross as the sign of our health and salvation. Each time we make the sign of the cross we remember our baptism into the death and resurrection of Christ.



FIRST READING: Numbers 21:4b-9

A reading from Numbers.

When the people spoke against God and Moses, the Lord sent poisonous snakes against them. Moses interceded for the people, and the Lord ordered him to erect a serpent of bronze on a pole. All who looked at it after having been bitten by a serpent would live.

[From Mount Hor the Israelites set out,] ^{4b} but the people became discouraged on the way. ⁵ The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." ⁶ Then the LORD sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. ⁷ The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the LORD and against you; pray to the LORD to take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. ⁸ And the LORD said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole, and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." ⁹ So Moses made a serpent of bronze and put it upon a pole, and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

A reading from 1 Corinthians.

At the heart of the Christian message is the word of the cross. This proclamation seems foolish to many because it reveals true divine power in the absolute weakness of Christ's crucifixion. True wisdom understands how ours is a God who suffers for and with humankind in the cross.

¹⁸ The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. ¹⁹ For it is written,

"I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart." ²⁰ Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scholar? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? ²¹ For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of the proclamation, to save those who believe. ²² For Jews ask for signs and Greeks desire wisdom, ²³ but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to gentiles, ²⁴ but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God.



Music Notes/Hymn Notes:

It is customary when September 14 falls on a Sunday, to observe Holy Cross Day. Our hymns and duet this morning reflect this day as we celebrate the triumph of the cross.

Our Gathering Hymn this morning, "In the Cross of Christ I Glory," was written by hymnist, John Bowring. It is said that Bowring once sailed by the ruins of a magnificent cathedral on the island of Maco. Only the front wall remained and on the top was a great metal cross, blackened with age. He was supposedly so moved by this sight that he wrote the words to this hymn, "In the cross of Christ I glory, towering o'er the wrecks of time." This story has been compared to a similar contemporary story: after the collapse of the World Trade Centers in 2001, Workers discovered a cross-shaped beam standing upright among the debris and ruins. This picture was published around the world and served as a symbol of hope in the aftermath of this destruction in New York City. The Cross holds deep personal meaning for us, giving us peace and joy in times of crises and disappointment. (Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins; Austin Lovelace)

Our Hymn of the Day this morning, "Lift High the Cross" is an English Christian hymn, written in 1887 by George Kitchin and revised in 1916 by Michael R. Newbolt. It has been said that this hymn was inspired by the story of Constantine the Great's conversion to Christianity after seeing a cross with "In hoc signo vinces" on it (translation: "in this sign you will conquer"). It was intended as a festival hymn and was first performed in Winchester Cathedral. "Lift High the Cross" was set to the tune of "Crucifer" by Sydney Nicholson. The hymn is often sung during Lent or Holy Week but is also used as a hymn in other parts of the worship service throughout the Church Year. First published in the United States in 1974, it appears in both our current hymnal and the previous <u>Lutheran Book of Worship</u>. (from Wikipedia)

In 1869, Fanny Crosby was shown a tune written by William Doane for which she wrote the words to our communion hymn, "Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross." It was first published in <u>Bright Jewels for the Sunday School</u> in 1869. It is interesting to note that Crosby, born in New York, was blinded at six weeks of age through the malpractice of a doctor. She attended a school for the blind in New York, where she later became a teacher and wrote remarkable

poetry that brought considerable acclaim to the school. She attended a revival in 1850 as she felt something was missing from her life. At this revival, she accepted Jesus as her Savior and from here on, she turned her poetic skills to hymn writing, focusing on the theme of the cross. The first line of each stanza of this hymn contains the phrase "near the cross," emphasizing the value of Christ's redeeming work on the cross. Each stanza has a slightly different aspect of the main theme. The first stanza describes redemption through Jesus' blood, and the second, the need of humanity for salvation. The third stanza is a prayer that the Christian would always remember God's love as shown on the cross, and the fourth looks forward to heaven.
