GOSPEL: Luke 16:1-13

The holy gospel according to Luke.

Glory to you, O Lord.

Jesus tells the curious story of a dishonest manager who cheats his employer and then is commended by him for having acted so shrewdly. Jesus wonders why his own followers are less creative and diligent in their stewardship given that they are managers of a far more valuable household.

¹ Then Jesus said to the disciples, "There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was squandering his property. ² So he summoned him and said to him, 'What is this that I hear about you? Give me an accounting of your management because you cannot be my manager any longer.' ³ Then the manager said to himself, 'What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. ⁴ I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes.' ⁵ So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' ⁶ He answered, 'A hundred jugs of olive oil.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty.' ⁷ Then he asked another, 'And how much do you owe?' He replied, 'A hundred containers of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill and make it eighty.' ⁸ And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly, for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. ⁹ And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone they may welcome you into the eternal homes.

¹⁰ "Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much, and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. ¹¹ If, then, you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? ¹² And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? ¹³ No slave can serve two masters, for a slave will either hate the one and love the other or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."

Hymn Notes:

Our gathering hymn this morning, "Son of God, Eternal Savior," was written by Somerset Corry Lowry (1853-1932) and published in *The Christian Social Union Hymnbook* in 1895. There are social implications in the gospels which are often overlooked or ignored by those who feel that a personal relationship to Christ is all that is necessary. Lowry's hymn reminds us that we have a common bond with the whole human race through Christ, that a life of service is required of our stewardship, and that we must pray for peace to end our strife and shame our selfish greed. Our prayer should always be "Thy will be done." Austin C. Lovelace, pg. 94)

Millions worldwide have found in the humble prayer text and lyric tune "Be Thou My Vision," our Hymn of the Day this morning, a vehicle for praise and worship. It offers a singular voice of fierce devotion rooted in medieval Celtic Christianity that is still relevant today. According to legend, the story behind the hymn is as follows: St. Patrick (385-461 AD) was a man zealous for the things of God. As a missionary, he defied an Irish King's edict that restricted the lighting of candles on Easter Eve. Patrick chose to honor God in spite the threat of death. King Logaire was so impressed with Patrick's brave devotion, that he let him continue his missionary work unhindered. An 8th Century Monk, Dallan Forgaill penned the words to *Be Thou My Vision*, as a tribute to St. Patrick's wholehearted loyalty to God. The hymn was translated from Irish to English in 1905 by Mary E. Byrne. In 1912, Eleanor H. Hull arranged the song into the verse most commonly found in English hymnals today. The music to accompany the lyrics is an ancient Irish folk tune called *Slane*. (Hymnary.org)

Our sending hymn this morning, "Take My Life and Let it Be," was written by Frances R. Havergal (1836-1879) and published in *Songs of Grace and Glory* in 1874. Miss Havergal, during a visit with friends, prayed that God would use her witness to win all ten members of the family to Christ. "Before I left the house, everyone got a blessing," she wrote. On the last night of her visit, twelve couplets came to her mind dealing with true consecration, which involves mind, body, words, deeds, intellect, will, money, possessions, and the whole self. The final couplet integrates and sums up these with "Ever, only, ALL for Thee!" , Austin C. Lovelace, pg. 97).
