


### **CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS**

## FIRST READING: 2 Kings 5:1-3, 7-15c

A reading from 2 Kings.

Naaman, a Syrian general, suffers from leprosy. In this passage Elisha miraculously cures his illness, but only after Naaman realizes, with the help of his servants, that he also needs healing for his pride. This foreign general then acknowledges the sovereignty of the God of Israel.

<sup>1</sup> Naaman, commander of the army of the king of Aram, was a great man and in high favor with his master because by him the LORD had given victory to Aram. The man, though a mighty warrior, suffered from a skin disease. <sup>2</sup> Now the Arameans on one of their raids had taken a young girl captive from the land of Israel, and she served Naaman's wife. <sup>3</sup> She said to her mistress, "If only my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria! He would cure him of his skin disease."

<sup>7</sup> When the king of Israel read the letter, he tore his clothes and said, "Am I God, to give death or life, that this man sends word to me to cure a man of his skin disease? Just look and see how he is trying to pick a quarrel with me."

<sup>8</sup> But when Elisha the man of God heard that the king of Israel had torn his clothes, he sent a message to the king, "Why have you torn your clothes? Let him come to me, that he may learn that there is a prophet in Israel." <sup>9</sup> So Naaman came with his horses and chariots and halted at the entrance of Elisha's house. <sup>10</sup> Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, "Go, wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored, and you shall be clean." <sup>11</sup> But Naaman became angry and went away, saying, "I thought that for me he would surely come out and stand and call on the name of the LORD his God and would wave his hand over the spot and cure the skin disease! <sup>12</sup> Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them and be clean?" He turned and went away in a rage. <sup>13</sup> But his servants approached and said to him, "Father, if the prophet had commanded you to do something difficult, would you not have done it? How much more, when all he said to you was, 'Wash, and be clean'?" <sup>14</sup> So he went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, according to the word of the man of God; his flesh was restored like the flesh of a young boy, and he was clean.

<sup>15a, b, c</sup> Then he returned to the man of God, he and all his company; he came and stood before him and said, "Now I know that there is no God in all the earth except in Israel."

## **SECOND READING: 2 Timothy 2:8-15**

A reading from 2 Timothy.

Though Paul is chained as a prisoner, the word of God is never shackled or confined. Timothy is encouraged to proclaim that word of freedom in an honest and upright life as well as in his teaching and preaching.

<sup>8</sup> Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David—that is my gospel, <sup>9</sup> for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. <sup>10</sup> Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. <sup>11</sup> The saying is sure:

If we have died with him, we will also live with him;

<sup>12</sup> if we endure, we will also reign with him;

if we deny him, he will also deny us;

<sup>13</sup> if we are faithless, he remains faithful—

he cannot deny himself.

<sup>14</sup>Remind them of this, and warn them before the Lord that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. <sup>15</sup>Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.

### **GOSPEL:** Luke 17:11-19

The holy gospel according to Luke.

Jesus' mission includes making people clean again. Unexpectedly, a Samaritan healed of leprosy becomes a model for those who would praise and worship God and give thanks for God's mercy.

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. <sup>12</sup> As he entered a village, ten men with a skin disease approached him. Keeping their distance, <sup>13</sup> they called out, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" <sup>14</sup> When he saw them, he said to them, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." And as they went, they were made clean. <sup>15</sup> Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. <sup>16</sup> He prostrated himself at Jesus's feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. <sup>17</sup> Then Jesus asked, "Were not ten made clean? So where are the other nine? <sup>18</sup> Did none of them return to give glory to God except this foreigner?" <sup>19</sup> Then he said to him, "Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well."





### **Music Notes/Hymn Notes:**

Our gathering hymn this morning, "Voices Raised to You," uses a text written by Dr. Herman G. Stuempfle, Jr. (1923-2007), and a melody composed by Carolyn Jenings. Dr. Stuempfle lived most of his life in Gettysburg, where at one point he served as President of the Lutheran Theological Seminary (now United Lutheran Seminary) in Gettysburg. Another prolific hymn writer, Dr. Stuempfle was a member of Christ Lutheran Church in Gettysburg. A beautiful hymn of praise, the text praises the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, the Triune God, as we offer our thanks and praise for all we have been given as part of God's creation. (hymnary.org)

Now Thank We All Our God: Did you know that there are at least 138 passages in Scripture on the subject of thanksgiving? Unfortunately, few hymns are geared exclusively to thanking God. Today's hymn of the day, "Now Thank We All Our God," is one of the hymns we have that expresses thanks. German Christians sang this hymn like Americans have sung the doxology. The hymn was written by Martin Rinkart (1586-1649), a Lutheran pastor who lived in the village of Eilenberg, Saxony, during the Thirty Years' War. The Swedish army had surrounded the city, but inside there was famine, plague, and fear. People were dying in large numbers and Rinkart conducted sometimes as many as 50 funerals a day. Rinkart, eventually the only surviving pastor in the city, was sent out to negotiate a treaty with the Swedes. He did it with such courage and faith that hostilities soon ended. Knowing there was no healing without thanksgiving, Rinkart composed this hymn for the survivors of Eilenberg. It has been sung around the world since. (Then Sings My Soul; Robert J. Morgan p. 17)

Our sending hymn today, "Give to Our God Immortal Praise," was written by Isaac Watts (1674-1748). It is a metrical version of Psalm 136, published in his Psalms of David in 1719. Originally eight verses, only three of those are included in our hymnal. The two greatest qualities of this hymn are in the way the title immediately shows the greatness and immortal "bigness" of God, and also having its roots in Psalm 136. The tune used is 'Duke Street', (note the title of the prelude), and it was first published anonymously in 1793 but later attributed to John Warrington Hatton. Little is known about Hatton but it is reported that he lived in Duke Street, St Helen's in Lancashire. (singhymnal.com)
