

FIRST READING: Genesis 32:22-31

A reading from Genesis.

Returning to the home he had fled many years before after stealing his brother's birthright and his father's blessing, Jacob wrestles all night long with a divine adversary who ultimately blesses him and changes his name to "Israel," a name that means "he wrestles with God."

²² The same night [Jacob] got up and took his two wives, his two maids, and his eleven children and crossed the ford of the Jabbok. ²³ He took them and sent them across the

stream, and likewise everything that he had. ²⁴ Jacob was left alone, and a man wrestled with him until daybreak. ²⁵ When the man saw that he did not prevail against Jacob, he struck him on the hip socket, and Jacob's hip was put out of joint as he wrestled with him. ²⁶ Then he said, "Let me go, for the day is breaking." But Jacob said, "I will not let you go, unless you bless me." ²⁷ So he said to him, "What is your name?" And he said, "Jacob." ²⁸ Then the man said, "You shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with humans and have prevailed." ²⁹ Then Jacob asked him, "Please tell me your name." But he said, "Why is it that you ask my name?" And there he blessed him. ³⁰ So Jacob called the place Peniel, saying, "For I have seen God face to face, yet my life is preserved." ³¹ The sun rose upon him as he passed Penuel, limping because of his hip.

The writer of this letter continues his instruction of Timothy, his younger colleague in ministry, by emphasizing the importance of faithful teaching despite opposition.

¹⁴ But as for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it ¹⁵ and how from childhood you have known sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. ¹⁶ All scripture is inspired by

God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, ¹⁷ so that the person of God may be proficient, equipped for every good work.

^{4:1} In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: ² proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favorable or unfavorable; convince, rebuke, and encourage with the utmost patience in teaching. ³ For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound teaching, but, having their ears tickled, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires ⁴ and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. ⁵ As for you, be sober in everything, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.



Hymn Notes:

Like so many Christians, Carolina Sandell learned that when pain and tragedy strike, God often uses that experience to deepen our faith. At age 26, Carolina experienced a tragedy that greatly affected the course of her life. She and her father, a Lutheran pastor, were crossing a Swedish lake, when the ship suddenly lurched, throwing her father overboard, and he drowned. Even though she had previously written many hymns, after losing her father, she poured out her heart in an endless stream of beautiful songs. Two of her most famous hymns used widely in America are "Children of the Heavenly Father," and today's sending hymn, "Day by Day." Truly a hymn of assurance, "Day by Day" reminds us that although no one can accurately predict the future, God knows what will happen and is in complete control of all coming events. (Hymnary.org; Christianity.org)

"Lord of all Hopefulness" is a Christian hymn written by English writer Jan Struther, and was published in the enlarged edition of *Songs of Praise* (Oxford University Press) in 1931. The hymn is used in liturgy, as we do today, at weddings, and also at the beginning of funeral services. It is one of the most popular hymns in the United Kingdom. "Lord of all Hopefulness" is commonly set to the melody of an Irish folksong named *Slane*. (Note the title of today's prelude). The melody is named after the Hill of Slane, the site where St. Patrick lit an Easter fire in defiance of the pagan king, Lóegaire, near the village of the same name in County Meath, Ireland. The hymn is included in a number of popular Christian hymn books, including the *New English Hymnal* and *Hymns and Psalms*. It is also sometimes included in Christian children's songbooks. An interesting note, this hymn was the opening hymn at the wedding of Prince Harry and Meghan Markle on May 19, 2018. (Wikipedia.com)
