

A reading from 2 Thessalonians.


Some members of the Thessalonian community, because of their belief in the nearness of Christ's return, had ceased to work, living off the generosity of other members of the community. The writer of this letter warns them bluntly that if they want to eat, they need to work.

<sup>6</sup> Now we command you, brothers and sisters, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from every brother or sister living irresponsibly and not according to the tradition that they received from us. <sup>7</sup> For you yourselves know how you ought to imitate us; we were not irresponsible when we were with you, <sup>8</sup> and we did not eat anyone's bread without paying for it, but with toil and labor we worked night and day so that we might not burden any of you. <sup>9</sup> This was not because we do not have that right but in order to give you an example to imitate. <sup>10</sup> For even when we were with you, we gave you this command: anyone unwilling to work should not eat. <sup>11</sup> For we hear that some of you are living irresponsibly, mere busybodies, not doing any work. <sup>12</sup> Now such persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work quietly and to earn their own living. <sup>13</sup> Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right.





## **Music Notes/Hymn Notes:**

In 1787, Dr. John Rippon published *A Selection of Hymns from the Best Authors*. The book was an immense success. Among the original hymns in the book was today's gathering hymn, "How Firm a Foundation." Perhaps the most noteworthy and appreciated feature of this hymn is how closely it resembles the words of the Bible itself. Originally having seven verses, our hymnal includes only four. Since its publication, "How Firm a Foundation" has enjoyed wide acceptance, especially in North America. It is known to have been the favorite hymn of General Robert E. Lee and was sung at his funeral. It is also said that once, while conducting evening prayers in Princeton Seminary's Oratory, Dr. Charles Hodge was so overcome with feeling during the last line of the hymn ("I'll never, no never, no never forsake," from Hebrews 13:5) that he could no longer sing but only gesture the words. Pay close attention to the power in these words, as we sing this hymn this morning.

Although not a hymn of Martin Luther, today's hymn of the day, "If You But Trust in God to Guide You," is included in the collection: Reformation: 50 Reformation Hymns, compiled by Chad Fothergill. The text and tune were written by George Neumark during the Thirty Years' War. After several unfortunate events in his life, things changed, and in his words, "his fortune changed so suddenly and, as it were, from heaven, so rejoiced my heart that I wrote my hymn." (Hymnary.org). The hymn was published in 1641 and later translated by Catherine Winkworth in 1855. A classic German chorale, this fine text focuses on trust in God's care in all of life's circumstances, both prosperous times and "evil days." As Christians we are counseled to be confident (st. 1), to have patience (st. 2), and to be faithful in service (st. 3). (Reformation: 50 Reformation Hymns; Hymnary.org).
