

An early Christian hymn praises the mystery of the political, personal, and mystical Christ, the one who was present at creation and is eternally reigning with God.

<sup>11</sup> May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, so that you may have all endurance and patience, joyfully <sup>12</sup> giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. <sup>13</sup> He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, <sup>14</sup> in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.


When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. <sup>34</sup> [[Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing."]] And they cast lots to divide his clothing. <sup>35</sup> And the people stood by watching, but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" <sup>36</sup> The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine <sup>37</sup> and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" <sup>38</sup> There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews."

One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" <sup>40</sup> But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? <sup>41</sup> And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." <sup>42</sup> Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come in your kingdom." <sup>43</sup> He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise." 





# **Music Notes/Hymn Notes:**

Our opening hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," is a declaration of praise, but it's also much more than that. The words both declare the majesty of Christ and task us with making that majesty known to all. This hymn references Philippians 2:9-11: "at the name of Jesus every knee should bow...and every tongue acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." We long for this day and declare our hope in its arrival in the text of this hymn. But are we willing to declare that hope to those who have not heard it? When originally written, the hymn was greatly used by missionaries in India. One particular story is of a Rev. Scott trying to reach a savage tribe in the Indian subcontinent. He set off into dangerous territory where he met a large party of warriors who surrounded him with spears pointed at his heart. Convinced he was going to die, he took out his violin,

prayed, closed his eyes, and began singing this hymn. When he reached the words, "let every kindred, every tribe," he opened his eyes and the warriors had lowered their spears, many with tears in their eyes. Knowing he had somehow reached them, he spent the next two years evangelizing this particular tribe. The final stanza of this great hymn declares, "We'll join the everlasting throng and crown him Lord of all!" Are we willing to lift our voices together to sing more than a hymn, and truly crown our God Lord of all? (Wikipedia; hymnary.org; and Then Sings My Soul; Robert Morgan).

Schonster, Herr Jesu, known to us as Beautiful Savior, our communion hymn this morning, dates back to the Roman Catholic Jesuits in a hymnal dated 1677, although it was also found in a manuscript dated 1662. The actual translator remains a mystery, The hymn emphasizes "the beauty and wonder of Christ, and it alludes to His dual nature, that He was both human and divine, God made flesh,"Son of God and Son of Man." (Then Sings My Soul, p.25). It is interesting to note that according to some accounts, this hymn was called "Crusader's Hymn" because it was sung by German Crusaders as they made their way to the Holy Land. But William Jensen Reynolds dismisses as "completely erroneous" any association of this hymn with the Crusades. Regardless of its exact origins, the hymn is truly a beautiful one, and a favorite of many. (Wikipedia). You will hear the hymn in two different forms this morning: first as the choir anthem with a new melody but with hints of the original woven in; and secondly, as our communion hymn.

Our sending hymn this morning, "Crown Him with Many Crowns," was written by two separate authors, Matthew Bridges (1800-1894) and Godfrey Thring (1823-1903), each version with six verses. Most hymnals make a selection from the twelve stanzas. The tune used is "Diademata," suggesting diadems or crowns, and matches the striking first line of poetry with an equally memorable first line of music. "Crown Him with Many Crowns," is a hymn that declares we are to crown our Lord with many crowns. Christ was not simply a prophet, He was not simply the carpenter's son, and He was not simply human, nor simply divine. Rather, this call to "crown him with many crowns" is a simple and yet profound declaration that Christ is many things, and everything. He is Lord of all. Each crown represents a different aspect of who Christ is – Lord of life, Lord of love, Lord of years, Lord of heaven, the Lamb upon the throne. Christ is King, Servant, Lamb, Shepherd, and we celebrate this all-encompassing nature of our Savior by crowning Him the Lord of all. (hymnary.org; and Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins, Austin C.
