



A reading from Isaiah.

The visionary message presented in this reading focuses on a future day when God establishes a universal reign of peace. Divine decisions will make war obsolete, and the worshiping community responds: "Let us walk in the light of that Lord now!"

For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; ¹² the night is far gone; the day is near. Let us then throw off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; ¹³ let us walk decently as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in illicit sex and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy. ¹⁴ Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

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*GOSPEL: Matthew 24:36-44

The holy gospel according to Matthew. Glory to you, O Lord.

Jesus describes his second coming as a sudden, turbulent event that will bring about deep change to our normal, day-to-day lives. Therefore, he urges people to stay awake, be aware, and wait expectantly, because the Son of Man will come unannounced.

[Jesus said to the disciples,] ³⁶ "About that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. ³⁷ For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. ³⁸ For as in the days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, ³⁹ and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so, too, will be the coming of the Son of Man. ⁴⁰ Then two will be in the field; one will be taken, and one will be left. ⁴¹ Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken, and one will be left. ⁴² Keep awake, therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. ⁴³ But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. ⁴⁴ Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect."





Music Notes/Hymn Notes:

Many songs have been inspired by happy times, but today's Hymn of the Day, "Wake, Awake for Night is Flying," was inspired by the worst of times. Philip Nicolai was a Lutheran pastor in Unna, Germany when the plague did its terrible work in the winter of 1597-1598. The plague took the lives of more than 1300 people in his community. He kept busy all winter conducting funerals and comforting the sick and grieving. He wrote this hymn as an encouragement—a statement of faith in the coming of the Christ who overcame death on the cross—and who overcomes death for us as well. In most cases, a poet writes the words to a hymn, and a musician adds the tune. However, in this case, Nicolai wrote both words and music. Johann Sebastian Bach came across Nicolai's hymn and made some small changes to make it more singable. In the process, Bach also helped to popularize it. The hymn was based on the Parable of the Wise and Foolish Virgins in Matthew 25:1-13. Although not our Gospel reading today, the hymn still relates to our readings. "Be on guard...be alert at all times" are phrases from today's Gospel reading. The opening stanza calls the followers of Christ to be roused and alert for His Second Coming. Stanza 2 describes the joyous scene when the bridegroom returns and takes His bride, the church, into the wedding feast. Finally, the third stanza adores the Lamb of God and describes the glorious scene in heaven, as given in Revelation 19 and 21, where the saints will worship in song forever. Our offertory hymn during Advent, "Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus," was written by Charles Wesley (1707-1788). It is a beautiful hymn that expresses deeply the two-fold purpose of the Advent season: we remember the birth of Christ, and we fiercely desire His coming again. Perhaps more than other Advent hymns, this text especially expresses our longing for Christ's second coming. Even though we know that Christ goes with us and before us every day, we long for the day when we are with Him in all of the fullness and glory He will bring. We long for the day when we are with Him in a New Heaven and New Earth, when all things are made new. And just as a young child crawls into its parent's arms after an absence, so too, we long for the day when we will be at rest in Christ, enfolded in the embrace of our Savior. The hymn's ultimate emphasis is on the kingship of Jesus, closing with a prayer that Christ will rule in our hearts alone. (It is interesting to note that Wesley originally intended for this to be a Christmas hymn). (Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins; Austin C. Lovelace, pg.25).
