

Just before Jesus begins his public ministry, John the Baptist appears, calling people to mend their ways and speaking of a powerful one who is to come.


- ¹ In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming,






COMMUNION SONG What Feast of Love (ELW 487) vs. 1,3



Music Notes/Hymn Notes:

Our gathering hymn this morning, "Hark the Glad Sound," was written by Philip Doddridge in 1735. Doddridge was a pastor of a Dissenting church, which means that he did not accept the authority of the Church of England. He wrote this hymn and many others—perhaps 400 in all—not for publication but to be sung by his congregation. His congregation didn't use hymnals, but instead had someone sing the hymn line by line from the pulpit with the congregation repeating each line in turn. Most of Doddridge's hymns were inspired by a particular scripture, and that was true of this hymn, which was inspired by Isaiah 61:1-2. When Jesus spoke in his hometown synagogue in Nazareth, (Luke 4: 18-19) he quoted those verses from Isaiah and then said, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing" (Luke 4:21). In other words, Jesus was saying that he had come to preach

good news, to bind up those who were broken, to proclaim liberty to captives, and to comfort those who mourn. It is in celebration of this work of Christ that we sing this hymn. It is interesting to note that Doddridge was one of 20 children, founded an academy where he taught Hebrew, Greek, philosophy, logic, algebra, trigonometry, and theology. It is said he died from overwork, the result of tuberculosis! (Hymn Notes for Church Bulletins: Austin C. Lovelace, pg. 44; sermonwriter.com/hymns).

Today's Hymn of the Day, *On Jordan's Banks, the Baptist's Cry,* was originally written in Latin by Charles Coffin and published in 1736. It was later translated into English by John Chandler and included in his hymnal. The text has undergone many revisions, and today it is hard to find two hymnals where the text is the same. Almost all hymnals include the same five verses, but the wording changes significantly from hymnal to hymnal. The overall theme is evident, regardless of the version used. Stanzas one and two are a message to us, instructing us to prepare the way of the Lord today. In stanza three, we confess our need for salvation, in stanza four we pray for healing and love, and stanza five serves as a doxology. Since this hymn calls us to make way for Christ, it is most fitting for Advent. It references John the Baptist, a key figure in the narrative of Christ's birth, and addresses the theme of Advent...to prepare for Christ's second coming. (Hymnary.org).
