Music Notes

Last Tuesday, July 28, marked the 276th anniversary of the death of Johann Sebastian Bach. He died at the age of 65 in Leipzig, Germany. His death is attributed to complications and a stroke with high fever, related to unsuccessful cataract surgery performed by the traveling ophthalmologist, John Taylor. He was originally buried at Old St. John's Cemetery in Leipzig where his grave went unmarked for nearly 150 years! In 1894, his remains were found and moved to a vault in the church, but the building was later destroyed by Allied bombing during WW2. In 1950 his remains were once again moved and taken to their present gravesite in St. Thomas Church.

Bach was born in 1685 into an already accomplished musical family. He married twice and was the father of 20 children, only 10 who survived adulthood. Today, his work is regarded as among the finest of mature baroque music (c. 1600-1750). More famous as an organist than as a composer in his own lifetime, Bach's rich legacy encompasses sacred and secular works, notably cantatas, of which 209 have survived to this day, organ compositions, and concertos, which influenced many later composers. Today, we recognize and honor the genius of Bach and his contributions to church music, especially to the Lutheran Church. Bach harmonized many chorales, but sadly only 8 are included in our current ELW hymnal. During communion distribution, some of these chorales will be played in place of singing a hymn.

Notes about today's music: Today's prelude is *Sheep May Safely Graze*, from Bach's Hunting Cantata. This composition was written as a soprano aria with lyrics that compare a good shepherd protecting his flock to a good ruler ensuring peace and prosperity. It is well loved for its tranquil, pastoral melody and is frequently used for solo instruments like piano and organ. The postlude, *Little Fugue in B flat Major*, is part of his Eight Little Preludes and Fugues, written during his early years, commonly referred to as his youthful period while he was court organist at Weimar. In addition, our canticle of praise and the post communion song are both Bach harmonizations of the hymns and are in our current ELW hymnal.
